Since there are long floats in the pattern, you will want to use a woven Fair Isle or ladderback jacquard technique

PATTERN INSTRUCTIONS

Brim

Using smaller needles, cast on 96 stitches and join, being careful not to twist the stitches. Work either a k2p2 ribbing or k1p1 ribbing for one inch for a one-layer brim. Work a two-inch brim if you want a folded brim. You will have about 12 rounds for a 1" brim, and 24 rounds for a 2" folded brim.

Body of Hat

Change to larger needles and increase 16 stitches evenly to 112 total stitches.

Be careful to work your floats so that they do not produce puckering on the surface or your knitting. It is helpful to spread your stitches out every inch or so that they aren't bunched together and are spaced the way that they'll look in the finished hat.

Work the charts through row 27. You can add rounds of solid color to achieve the height that you want.

Crown Decreases

When the hat is at the desired length, knit the decrease rows as follows: Round 1 *k6, k2tog* repeat to end Round 2 Knit Round 3 *k5, k2tog* repeat to end Round 4 Knit Round 5 *k4, k2tog* repeat to end Round 6 Knit Round 7 *k3, k2tog* repeat to end Round 8 Knit Round 9 *k2, k2tog* repeat to end Round 10 Knit Round 11 *k1, k2tog* repeat to end Round 12 *k2tog* repeat to end

Finishing


Break off yarn, thread through a tapestry needle and draw the yarn through all remaining 14 stitches. Fasten off and weave in ends. Block gently. You're ready for launch or the landing!
